Clinical Commissioning Group

Please be aware that Driffield Minor Injury Unit will be closing permanently on Tuesday 3 April at 6pm and be replaced with Driffield 8 to 8 Centre, open from Wednesday 4 April 2018 8am - 8pm daily.

If you have an urgent injury that is not serious, life or limb threatening, you first need to contact NHS 111. They will ask you a number of questions to decide what advice to give you or the most appropriate place to go for treatment. They will arrange an appointment at your nearest 8 to 8 Centre or Urgent Treatment Centre depending on where is most suitable for your injury.



Burton Fleming History Group were presented with a talk by Dr. Andrew Woods, Senior Curator at the Yorkshire Museum, York.

The subject was the Wold Newton Coin Hoard which was found by metal detectorists in a field somewhere outside Wold Newton. There have previously been various concentrations of metal detector fines across the Wolds but this was to be the largest

hoard ever found in Northern England.

The hoard itself was а buried found in ceramic vessel packed with one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight Roman coins. The find recorded was treasure and went to the British Museum for x-ray "excavation" extract the coins from the vessel. Because of

the coins good condition, the team were able to determine the exact period, 293AD and 305AD, when they were struck and issued. Between them they represented ten different emperors. From one crucial coin representing Constantine the Great as a Senior Emperor they were able to deduce that the Hoard was buried in late 307AD and early 308AD.

The way the coins were layered in the vessel, with earliest coins at the bottom and later coins at the top, suggested that the coins were probably savings either of one quite wealthy person or the savings of a small community.

To give a sense of worth at the time the coins equate to the equivalent of a labourer's wage for six years or a carpenter's wage for three years.

Why the coins were abandoned there we do not know but hopefully time and future investigation may

develop more clues. The fact that the hoard was buried at the time of military and political uncertainty may be the reason the coins were never recovered at the time.

1700 years after they were buried the coin hoard can now be viewed on display at the Yorkshire Museum in York.

After the talk the secretary reminded the Group of the arranged visit and guided tour of Scarborough Castle, with afternoon tea, on the afternoon of Thursday 26th April. Names, with money, required on or before 19th April.



Lissett Wind Farm Fund

The Lissett Community Wind Farm Fund Panel have allocated an amount of money for the security of homes in the area. The fund has already secured over 200 homes and there are now funds available to secure more.

The project aims to reduce burglaries in dwellings and non-dwellings, reduce the risk of re offending, and residents' fear of crime. It will involve carrying out home security assessments and the supply and fitting of home security equipment to dwellings and outbuildings.
