Dr Caroline Woods-Peel has joined the staff and we hope this will help to improve the problems with waiting times for appointments and give much needed support for Dr Jaidev and her staff. We hope the new Doctor will soon be comfortable in her new post and that we will all meet her in due course. The PPG Newsletter we produced last month was distributed in shops in Hunmanby and copies also available at Burton Fleming Post Office Stores - we hope to produce a second edition nearer Christmas. 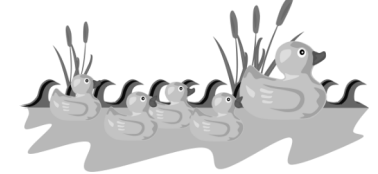

## HISTORY GROUP

Burton Fleming History Group opened their new season with a talk from David Smith who presented 'Have I Got Historic Newspapers for You.'

David began by speaking about the history of newspapers when the first paper, a single sheet, was printed in 1513. He described how sales and popularity of papers grew through development and modernisation of the printing press. Even the coming of the railway led to their success. People had come to rely on papers, both national and local, for their daily news. However, he ended his talk by telling us of their present day demise because of television, adverts and on line news.



Central to all this David featured some old cuttings relating to the village and some of its residents. Petty crimes, war time clips, accidents and injuries were all reported along with some humorous cuttings which brought everything closer to home.

Our next talk is about the history Wharram Percy. Alastair Oswald from English Heritage presents and describes the history of this famous deserted Medieval village. Dear Friends,

Do you find the news rather depressing? Wherever we look things seem to be going wrong in the world. The issues which face it are very serious, they should never be underestimated. Wherever people's lives and well-being are threatened, whenever people get to a situation where there seems to be no way out and they are trapped then despair can take hold.
